

From the Pastor

Happy Lent:

I'm not certain if I've ever used that opening. I'm also not sure if anybody has ever wished me a happy Lent. But that is where I am, and that is what I wish for you this Lenten season.

Every year Lent offers the opportunity to give up things. I will admit that I'm not that good at giving up things. In past Lenten seasons I have given up skydiving and chitlins. One year, I even gave up Facebook. And if you know me at all, giving up Facebook was not any great sacrifice on my part.

I'm not certain if I have done this before, but this year, the things I am going to give up are guilt, shame, grudges, and vengeance.

I invite you all to give up feeling guilty. I also invite you to give up making other people feel guilty.

I invite you all to give up, shame and being ashamed. I challenge you to not shame others.

I started with the easy ones, because giving up grudges and vengeance are hard. But one of the later stops in our journey is at the Cross of Jesus. He didn't hold a grudge against those who physically crucified him, and he didn't hold a grudge against the rest of us who made his crucifixion necessary. He was raised from the dead on the third day, not to enact vengeance against the world that you didn't deserve him, or appreciate the sacrifice he had made.

I am a fan of wrestling. Actually, I am a fan of rassling. Some of my favorite memories are when my hero in the ring was getting the tar beaten out of him. The bad guy was hitting him over and over and our hero was almost gone and then there is that moment when the bad guy throws what should be the coup de grace. But somehow the hero catches that punch and you see the fire in his eyes. This marks the moment when the match turns decisively, the hero has had enough and he rises up and defeats the bad guy.

So you say Pastor why are you talking about wrestling? Aren't we a church? Yes, and the biggest difference is that instead of Jesus triumphing by coming down off the cross, he stayed there. There would be no heroic triumph from Jesus. He hung there and won the victory by hanging there until he died.

Lent is the time of reflection. I want us to reflect on the fact that our world is really heading to hell in a handbasket. So this Lenten season I want us to try to make

space for doing good. I want to try to offer healing. I say this a lot and I really mean it I want us to let go and let God be God.

I want us to live our lives this Lenten season in the shape of a cross. Recognizing that we live our lives in relation to God, our Creator, but also in relation to our sisters and brothers who share the journey of life with us.

I hope that you have not had too many seasons of spiritual darkness in your lives. Unfortunately, I've had too many in mine. So I'm inviting you this year to be a candle for our sisters and brothers, who are going through a time of darkness.

In Genesis, chapter 2, God creates people from the dust of the ground. When he finishes forming their bodies, he breathes life into them. On Ash Wednesday, we impose the ashes on foreheads with the admonition that we are dust, and to dust we will return.

But that dust is created in the image of God Almighty, and it bears his breath upon our souls. So I pray that you will recognize God in everyone you meet. Because God is truly there, and he always has been.

Give up denying the God image in people that are a pain, and I recognize that a lot of people are extremely painful. See God in them anyway.

The children of Israel, God's chosen people, had forgotten, almost everything about their relationship with the creator. They were grumbling and complaining, and they were ready to go back into slavery just to have their bellies filled. And God gave them bread from heaven.

I don't know how to give bread from heaven. But I do know how we can be bread for people in need. One day, when Jesus was preaching, 5000 people had gathered and were hungry. The only thing there was to eat was a sack lunch. One young man had brought with five loaves and two fish. Jesus took what was offered, blistered, and fed the multitude.

We don't have to know how, we just have to give our offering to Jesus and let him decide how.

Let's be Christ to this dark loving world and the church the Christ calls us to be this Lent.



Lenten Offering

Ash Wednesday, March 5th, will be the beginning of the Lenten season. Traditionally in this season, Christians seek ways to grow closer to God. One way is a sacrificial daily offering. It is about giving up something, and in turn, you give to others. It may be the price of that daily soft drink, or a cup of coffee put aside from Ash Wednesday through April 13th and maybe by fasting one meal a week or more and spending that time in prayer: and adding those dollars to your Lenten gift. Sacrificial giving is a means of grace that draws us closer to God.

We know the needs around the world are overwhelming, and individually many of us cannot financially support every organization that contacts us for help. This is true individually and for the congregation; however, together, we do more, we are better together.

During the Lenten season some embrace the spiritual focus of Lent by sacrificing something daily; a cup of coffee, a coke, or a meal, then to donate the cost to the Lenten offering. These offerings will be divided equally between our North Georgia and world offerings. This Lenten offering makes it more manageable than asking for monthly donations. Individually, we are limited to what we can do, but we reach around the globe together. We are better together. Please pray about your sacrificial giving, your gifts beyond the tithe.
